This guide gives a brief introduction to the variety of sources available for researching the history of Frecheville at Sheffield Archives and Local Studies Library.

Frecheville lies 4 ½ miles south east of Sheffield City Centre.

Note that until 1967 Frecheville was in the county of Derbyshire. For local government purposes it came within the jurisdiction of Chesterfield Rural District Council. Ecclesiastically it was part of the parish of Beighton until c. 1943.

There is a separate Guide for Beighton.

### Church registers and records, monumental (gravestone) inscriptions and cemeteries

A temporary wooden church for Frecheville was opened for worship in December 1934, later becoming the parish of St Cyprian, Frecheville. Prior to this Frecheville lay within the parish of St Mary, Beighton.

Diocese of Sheffield, faculties from 1914 onwards (these detail changes made to Anglican church buildings) (Sheffield Archives: DIOC/FAC)

Frecheville (in Beighton) was in the Diocese of Lichfield until 1884, when it became part of the newly-established Diocese of Southwell. The parish was subsequently transferred to the Diocese of Derby on its formation in 1927, and, on the creation of the county of South Yorkshire in 1974, Beighton was transferred to the Diocese of Sheffield. Archives are located as follows:

#### Clubs, Societies and Charities

A search of the online catalogues and the card indexes at Archives and Local Studies may reveal records from Frecheville based clubs, societies and charities; for instance:

#### **Courts**

The Magistrates Court (or Petty Sessions court) records deal mainly with minor offences and licensing the sale and consumption of liquor. Records of the Sheffield Division cover the borough and City of Sheffield and records of Upper Strafforth and Tickhill Division of the West Riding of Yorkshire cover areas outside the borough such as Handsworth, Ecclesfield and Bradfield, c. 1870 - 1976. (Sheffield Archives: MC)

There are also records of the Court of Quarter Sessions from 1880. (Sheffield Archives: QS)

#### **Electoral Registers and Poll Books**

Sometimes known as Burgess Rolls or voters' lists, in essence, electoral rolls are lists of people that are entitled to vote. The Sheffield Local Studies Library has a comprehensive collection from 1841 onwards. #### **Hospitals**

Sheffield Archives has records from over 50 hospitals, including annual reports, photographs and administrative records.

As Frecheville was in Derbyshire until 1967 older records will be at <u>Derbyshire</u> Record Office.

#### Land, Building and Property Records

The main housing estate, which gave its name to the area Frecheville, was built in the 1930s and was named after the Frecheville family who were lords of the manor of Staveley. All of the street names are for villages in the Peak District.

The Local Studies Library has a collection of sale particulars (often with plans) dating from the late 18<sup>th</sup> century; for instance, there is a catalogue for the sale of Drake House Estate, 1909 (*Sheffield Local Studies Library: PLC BEIG4*).

In addition there are a few planning applications from Chesterfield Rural District Council (which included Frecheville) (Sheffield Archives: CA516 and CA519), as well as Sheffield City Council (Sheffield Archives: CA206), etc. For example, planning application for 196 houses off Alport Road and Birley Moor Road, Frecheville, 1948 (Sheffield Archives: CA519/9). There may also be planning applications at Derbyshire Record Office.

There are also deeds to properties and records of land valuations which detail owners and occupiers at Sheffield Archives.

A search of the Archives and Local Studies online catalogues and the card indexes may reveal relevant entries.

As Frecheville was in Derbyshire until 1967 some land, building and property records may be at <u>Derbyshire Record Office</u>.

#### Maps

There are large-scale maps of the Sheffield area from 1853 to the present day. Comprehensive coverage of Sheffield and partial coverage of the surrounding areas is available at Sheffield Local Studies Library. Sheffield Archives has incomplete historic coverage of most of South Yorkshire. The two main Sheffield newspapers are the *Sheffield Morning Telegraph* (later *Sheffield Telegraph*) and *The Star*, and these are available on microfilm at Sheffield Local Studies Library.

Wills and probate records relating to those who died in Frecheville prior to 1858 are held within the Lichfield Diocesan archives at the <u>Lichfield Record Office</u>. Probate records after 1858 are held at <u>The National Archives</u> (TNA).

Court records will be held at the <u>Derbyshire Record Office</u> and at the <u>National Archives</u>.

<u>The National Archives</u> (TNA) holds records of central government departments and agencies. You can search the <u>TNA catalogue</u> online.

Information on archaeological sites and ancient monuments is held by the <u>South Yorkshire Archaeology Service's Sites and Monuments Record</u>.
