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#### Introduction

This booklet lists sources available within Sheffield Libraries Archives and Information for the study of the history of Sheffield's cinemas. It is not a detailed history of cinema rather it points the reader who wishes to carry out their own research to what is available within Sheffield Libraries and Archives.

The first true motion pictures were produced by the Lumière Brothers in the 1890s. Although preceded by Thomas Edison's *kinetoscope*, which was viewed by an individual through a peephole viewer, their portable *Cinematograph* was capable of both recording and projecting film. Initially shown as travelling shows and part of variety acts, the popularity of cinema grew rapidly in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. In Sheffield, this was pioneered by the Sheffield Photo Co., run by the Mottershaw family, which, travelling in a horse drawn cart, displayed films in local halls. The Mottershaws were also innovators in producing films of the popular 'chase' genre, beginning with '*A Daring Daylight Burglary*' in 1903, and proving influential in the developing British film industry.

Following the introduction of fire safety legislation controlling the use of highly flammable Nitrate film stock, travelling shows were largely replaced by purpose built cinema halls, which rapidly proliferated. While the Central Hall, Norfolk Street had been Sheffield's first Cinema when it opened on the 10<sup>th</sup> July 1905, all films were accompanied by variety acts. The city's first purpose built cinema was the Sheffield Picture Palace in Union Street, opening in August 1910, and the following years saw a proliferation of small theatres. From the late 1920s, the addition of sound to film spurred another new wave of theatres in the 1930s, with the Paragon becoming Sheffield's first cinema designed in the sound era.

This expansion was halted by the outbreak of the Second World War, though cinemas continued to operate. Over the 12<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> of December 1940, the city was bombed in the 'Sheffield Blitz', killing over 660 people and causing severe damage to the city. Several cinemas were badly hit during the bombing, and did not re-open.

By the 1950s and 60s, audience numbers were beginning to decline and cinemas began to close, finding it difficult to compete with the rising popularity of television. Despite the advent of new innovations such as stereophonic sound and bigger screens, and the normalisation of colour film, many of the original theatres closed, and the buildings were either re-purposed as supermarkets and bingo-halls, or demolished.

The 1980s and 90s saw the emergence and success of a new kind of cinema - the multiplex. Often linked to the development of large retail areas and with multiple screens, they established the dominance of a few, far larger corporate cinemas catering to audiences from across a much wider area. Sheffield's first multiplex was the AMC Crystal Peaks, opening in 1988. However, the opening of the Showroom in 1995 has maintained the presence of independent and arthouse cinema in the city.


