TIMELINE



People from the Caribbean have been coming to the UK since the 19th Century, perhaps even earlier. There are records of small communities in port towns and cities during this time.



Unrestricted travel around the Empire and Commonwealth meant that the number of Caribbean people rose sharply. It was during this time that a Caribbean community began to establish in Sheffield, as people moved to work in heavy industries, for example steel.








Other official languages of Caribbean nations include French, Spanish, Dutch and Caribbean Creole, although these are likely to only be spoken by a small number of residents in Sheffield













The proportion of Black Caribbean 16 to 18 year olds not in education, employment or training (NEET)






UNPAID CARERS

HEALTH CONDITIONS



DIABETES

Nationally, the prevalence of doctor-diagnosed diabetes is significantly higher amongst Black Caribbean men, 10.0%, and women, 8.4%, compared with the averages of 4.3% and 3.4%, respectively.



SMOKING

24% of Black Caribbean women in England are current smokers, compared with 23% of all females. Nationally, however, smoking has declined since 2004, so this figure may have fallen.
