












Top 5 Industries of Employment

Top 5 Industries of Employment







The number of White Traveller of Irish Heritage pupils (years 0-14). This figure has grown by 59% in the last 8 years.







Life Expectancy

A 2004 report by Sheffield University concluded that the life expectancy of Gypsies and Travellers is between 10 and 12 years less than the settled population. A study conducted in 2005 by the Leed's Racial Equality Council found the gap to be around 28 years, and the Department of Health have reported a disparity of around 20 years.

General Health

The Sheffield report also identified a number of general health outcomes. The report the Gypsy and Traveller population have higher rates of:

- Long-term illness,
- Arthritis, asthma, chest pain, chronic coughs, bronchitis and diabetes
- **Mobility problems**

Gypsy Travellers who were living in a house were found to be in the poorest health.
