
Shruti Bhargava is an independent consultant and facilitator with particular interests in tackling the challenges that people think are impossible.

Dr Martin Wilkie


Consultant Kidney Specialist at Sheffield Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust working in home dialysis for 25 years.
