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Introduction

This booklet provides a list of sources available at Sheffield Libraries Archives and Information for the study of HIV/AIDS in Sheffield.

The 1980s bore witness to the emergence of one of the most devastating health crises in modern history. Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS), caused by the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), quickly emerged as a global concern, triggering panic, challenging medical understanding, social norms and public policy.

AIDS was first recognised in the early 1980s when a cluster of cases of a rare lung infection emerged in the United States of America. It was identified as a mysterious and deadly disease affecting gay men and other marginalised communities, such as drug users. Stigmatisation and discrimination against those affected by HIV was very prominent, often fuelled by fear and lack of knowledge. Gay men, in particular, bore the brunt of this prejudice, with the disease being mislabelled as the 'gay plague'. The lack of treatment and medical involvement only exacerbated both the social and emotional toll on patients and their loved ones.

The initial response to the pandemic was characterised by a lack of urgency. Governments across the globe were slow to provide resources for research, prevention and treatment, fuelled in part by homophobia. Community-based organisations, often led by LGBTQ+ groups, played a critical role in shaping public perceptions, fighting stigma, providing resources and demanding government action. As the scale of the endemic grew and cases were identified beyond the initially affected groups, governments and international health organizations were forced into taking decisive action. In the UK, the National Health Service (NHS) took significant steps in providing access to testing, treatment and care through specialised clinics and public education efforts. Policy changes also played a crucial role in the UK's response to the crisis. The government showed its commitment by passing the *AIDS (Control) Act* in 1987, which prohibited discrimination against individuals with HIV. The crisis did not have a definitive end, instead, it evolved over time after several medical advances, public awareness campaigns and policy changes.

In 2021, Channel 4 screened Russell T. Davies' 'It's A Sin', a five-part drama from about five friends living in the shadow of AIDS. The show provided a fresh perspective on the events and societal attitudes surrounding the crisis and contributed to increasing awareness, empathy, and a better understanding of the challenges faced by those affected.

AIDS deaths still rising

Trent Regional Health Authority area are set to double.

They agreed an urgent programme of action to combat the AIDS socurge in the region, which takes in South Lincolnshire.

Local health chiefs are being ordered to submit details of AIDS victims in their areas to the regional health HQ at Sheffield for a full assessment of the scale of the problem and how to tackle it. A regional advisory group is also to be formed, with experts from within the region whose job will be to advise the regional health authority and districts of the

District health authority managers are being invited to a seminar on the AIDS menace, together with senior health workers, to identify future action.

Professor James Scott, the Regional Medical Officer based at Sheffield, told Monday's meeting that three people had died of AIDS in the region so far. He expected another three to die by Christmas.

Some 46 people had the disease in the region — compared to 1,100 nationally and 384 in the North West Thames region.

Prof Scott said: "It's a big problem for us. We can't be fulled into a false sense of security. We need to concentrate now on education and information.

"We can't just sit back and

"We can't just sit back and do nothing." He said 25 to 30 per cent of people who de-veloped the disease would

die.

AIDS was not a notifiable disease and there was pressure to release figures of victims by district health authority and county areas.

The regional health authority agreed that the format of its planned public education campaign should not be decided until after the January distribution of leaflets about AIDS to Britain's 23 million homes.







At the height of the AIDS epidemic when the stigma was so severe, Princess Diana opened the UK's first specialist HIV/AIDS unit at London's Middlesex Hospital. During her visit, she famously shook hands with patients without gloves stating:

'HIV does not make people dangerous to know. You can shake their hands and give them a hug. Heaven knows they need it. What's more, you can share their homes, their workplaces, and their playgrounds and toys.'

National Health Service records

Sheffield Archives has records from over 50 hospitals including annual reports, photographs and administrative records. The Local Studies Library has annual reports from various NHS Trusts.

It is possible that these records will refer to policy making around HIV/AIDS support and individuals diagnosed with HIV/AIDS (although such records would be subject to access restrictions).

Coroners' records (inquests and post-mortems)

Sheffield Archives has coroner' records dating back to the early 20th century including selected inquest case files (and some post-mortems, census years). The coroner determines who the deceased was and how, when and where they came by their death. If the death is thought to be suspicious, for example, with unknown cause or unnatural, the coroner can decide to hold a post-mortem examination or inquest. It is likely that HIV/AIDS cases will start to be reported by the Coroner

during the 1980s and 1990s - however, these conditions were not always directly identified, especially in the initial period.

Access to coroners' court records is restricted for a minimum of 30 years under section 32 of the Freedom of Information Act. The records are also subject to a concurrent restriction of 75 years under the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). Please refer to Sheffield Archives staff for advice on how to access these records.
